At St Augustine of Canterbury Primary School, we want our pupils, upon leaving primary school, to be **physically literate** and to have the **knowledge, skills and motivation** necessary to equip them for a **healthy, active lifestyle** and **lifelong participation** in physical activity and sport.

Our objective, with support from the Sport Premium funding, is to achieve a **self-sustaining** improvement in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools against five key indicators:

1. the engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles
2. the profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
3. increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
4. broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
5. increased participation in competitive sport

This academic year St Augustine of Canterbury Primary School has received a total of **£9090**. This academic year we have actually spent **£8961.10**.
